In 2004 VISION 2020: The Right to Sight - INDIA (VISION 2020 INDIA) was launched in coordination with the government, International NGOs (CBM, Lions Club International Foundation, Operation Eyesight Universal, Orbis, Seva Foundation, Sightsavers) working in India, Aravind Eye Care System, L V Prasad Eye Institute and Dr R P Centre for Ophthalmic Sciences, AIIMS.

In our remarkable journey of 18 years we have been successful in bringing together diverse stakeholders - government, eye care service providers, policy makers, international development agencies and the eye care industry on to a common platform towards achieving the aim of eliminating avoidable blindness.




## Organisational Development
